I will be starting up the Sailors' Gatherings shortly (February 1st) and hope you will be able to make it out on



Racing Officer Report

2019 was another successful year of sailing and although we tried something different this year with two of the regattas it didn't really work as planned so look out for the plans for 2020 - it's all about getting boats on the water.

For the club racing series we returned to separate Thursday and Sunday series which seems to be the preferred format. Both of the Sunday series had good participation but Thursday's suffered from a combination of poor weather or occasionally a lack of sailors! PCYC continued to participate in the Thursday racing, we also saw a big increase in the number of catamarans - we may have to consider separate starts!

- Sunday series 1 - 18 boats over 8 races
- Sunday series 2 - 24 boats over 12 races
- Thursday series 1 - 21 boats over 6 races (we needed a make-up day to get the series in)
- Thursday series 2 - 21 boats over 6 races

Regattas

The GOCATS Regatta in July was a great success with the fleets split between High and Low Fleets

We tried something different for the CL16/Wayfarer regatta this year - we made it a one day event to try and encourage more club sailors to participate disappointingly we had no CL16 sailors and only three visitors so 2020 will return to a two

day event. The winners of the 8 boat fleet were Rob Wierdsma and Paul Taylor (???)

The Moe Fraser Regatta was planned for the traditional last day of the sailing and unfortunately despite the race duty teams best efforts setting a course

proved impossible and the decision was made to abandon. This is not the first time we have been

unable to complete the Moe Fraser due to unfavorable wind conditions so 2020 we will plan for more flexibility in the scheduled date.

Despite no racing for the Moe Fraser we held a hugely successful end of season with prize giving - with the lucky prize winners receiving MSC logo'd goodies - you know what to do if you want one - get out there and sail.

Plans for 2020 - the sailing committee will be meeting shortly. to plan the season - in addition to the "normal" stuff we will have "Pro-Am" races for less experienced sailors to get out there and help them gain more confidence and training sessions - including race officer training. A personal handicap system has been worked out and the details of how it works will be explained before the start of the season.

Finally I am regularly asked what inspired me to race - one of the big influences on me was a boat named Maiden which competed in 1989/1990 Whitbread Race. At the time the race was covered on regular TV updates and the story of the all-female boat successfully sailing around the world despite the traditional male domination of the sport saying it couldn't be done was compulsive viewing for me. The outcome was I persuaded a reluctant husband to start sailing lessons and the rest is history - it's a fabulous sport whether it's dinghy racing, cruising or racing yachts across the oceans.

We have a great club with wonderful facilities let's make sure we make the most of being on the water in 2020 - see you out there.

All the best for 2020 and I'm looking forward to seeing all of you at the many future functions of our club.



Over the past year or so we have focused our efforts on using the club website and leveraging a couple of social media platforms to more effectively:


- communicate with our members
